Introduction

The introduction provides a good background on the frequency and types of oesophageal foreign bodies (Lines 14-19). However, the citation format could be improved for better readability. For example, "Foreign bodies in the oesophagus are twice as common as bronchial foreign bodies (1)" instead of "Foreign bodies in the oesophagus are twice common than bronchial foreign bodies (1)" (Lines 14-15).

The explanation of life-threatening complications and management factors is well-presented (Lines 20-28). Ensure all references are correctly formatted.

Case Report

The case report is detailed and thorough. It starts with the patient's background and the initial attempts at retrieval (Lines 38-45). The description of the CT scan findings and the surgical procedure is clear and well-structured (Lines 46-63).

The inclusion of images (Figures 1 and 2) is useful for understanding the case better (Lines 48-52, 63-66). Ensure that all images are correctly labeled and referenced in the text.

Discussion

The discussion effectively highlights the challenges of endoscopic retrieval and the need for an open approach in certain cases (Lines 74-89). The mention of complications associated with endoscopic retrieval adds depth to the discussion (Lines 91-97).

The discussion could benefit from comparing this case with similar cases reported in the literature. This would provide a broader context and highlight the uniqueness of the case.
