The research examines the epidemiological, clinical, and therapeutic aspects of depression in children and adolescents, which is essential for enhancing understanding and improving care strategies for this vulnerable population.

The introduction effectively contextualizes the significance of depression as a psychiatric disorder and the increasing prevalence of this condition among children and adolescents. It establishes the critical period of adolescence as a time of vulnerability and sets up the study by pointing out the challenges in diagnosing depression due to its varied clinical presentation. The mention of the severe consequences of untreated depression, such as suicide, school dropout, and social isolation, strengthens the need for focused research and intervention.

The manuscript clearly defines its three main objectives: describing the epidemiological characteristics of pediatric depression, detailing its clinical presentation, and outlining the management strategies. The use

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of a descriptive retrospective study based on medical records from the pediatric psychiatry outpatient unit at CHU Mohamed VI in Marrakech is an appropriate method to examine this topic. The time frame of December 2024 to January 2025 is noted, which aligns with the aim of gathering recent data. The methodology is sound and allows for an in-depth examination of the cases, focusing on a range of variables such as age, sex, socio-economic background, and clinical factors.

Criteria for Inclusion and Exclusion:

The inclusion and exclusion criteria are clearly laid out and are well thought out. They ensure that the study sample is representative and that the data collected is reliable. The inclusion of patients aged 0 to 17 years who have a documented diagnosis of depression ensures that the study captures a wide spectrum of pediatric depression cases. The exclusion criteria of incomplete medical records and single consultations are standard and appropriate to ensure the accuracy and reliability of the data.

While the manuscript does not yet present the results, the research design suggests that it will yield valuable data on the prevalence of depression in this age group, its clinical manifestations, and the associated comorbidities. The study is expected to provide a comprehensive view of how depression presents differently in younger children versus adolescents, and it may also highlight important demographic or social factors contributing to the development and progression of depression in this population.

The findings are likely to provide important insights into the clinical management of pediatric depression, focusing on how clinicians can adapt treatment strategies to suit the unique needs of children and adolescents.
