Reviewer's Comment for Publication:

The manuscript presents an experimental investigation into the effects of the Problem-Based Gamification Learning (PBGL) model and learning interest on students' critical thinking skills, using a 2x2 factorial design. The topic is timely and relevant in the context of 21st-century education and active learning strategies. The methodology is well-structured, and the use of SPSS-based ANOVA provides analytical rigor. However, minor revisions related to structure, coherence, and formatting are suggested before final acceptance.

Detailed Reviewer's Report

Strengths:

- 1. **Relevance & Originality**: The study responds to an underexplored area in the Indian context, how shared leadership impacts identity construction and value-based professional development within DIETs.
- 2. **NEP 2020 Alignment**: The integration of NEP 2020 principles (e.g., inclusion, ethics, experiential learning) strengthens the policy-practice connection.
- 3. **Triangulated Perspectives**: Inclusion of prospective teachers, teacher educators, and the principal provides a rich, multi-voiced understanding of shared leadership practices.
- 4. **Use of Thematic Analysis**: The Braun & Clarke (2006) model is applied rigorously. The structured presentation through tables is clear and logically supports research objectives.
- 5. **Practice-Oriented Recommendations**: The manuscript offers actionable strategies (e.g., councils, flexible timetabling, faculty mentorship) that can guide institutional improvement.

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Weaknesses:

- 1. Language and Grammar: Some parts contain long and compound sentences that could be simplified. Occasional grammatical lapses and punctuation issues affect flow.
- 2. **Table Formatting**: Tables (especially Table 1 and Table 2) can be improved by adding uniform styling, clear captions, and direct integration into the main narrative.
- 3. **International Scope**: While contextual depth is commendable, limited engagement with global studies on shared leadership restricts comparative analysis. Consider including a few more global references in the discussion.
- 4. **Results-Discussion Connection**: Some insightful findings (e.g., value formation) could be further connected with existing leadership theories (e.g., transformational or servant leadership) to enhance theoretical grounding.
- 5. **Abstract and Conclusion**: These sections are well written but can be made more concise. Key findings could be highlighted in bullet form in the conclusion for clarity.
