Reviewer's Comment for Publication.

Résumé (French) Review:

The résumé presents breast cancer as the most common cancer among women in Western countries, emphasizing both medical progress and persistent psychosocial challenges. While therapeutic advancements have increased survival rates and life expectancy, patients continue to face existential anxiety and psychological vulnerability. The text highlights three principal domains of impact: the patient's relationship with her body, transformations in social and family roles, and changes in relational dynamics. These may range from isolation to reinvestment in authentic relationships or increased openness to broader social networks. The résumé underscores the predictive role of socio-familial support in shaping both psychological adaptation and certain medical outcomes. The narrative is cohesive, balancing clinical facts with psychosocial dimensions.

Abstract (English) Review:

The English abstract mirrors the French résumé with fidelity, presenting breast cancer as the most prevalent female cancer in Western countries. It clearly articulates the duality between therapeutic hope and the persistence of psychological vulnerability. The abstract emphasizes changes in body perception, disruptions in social and family roles, and relational dynamics

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fluctuating between withdrawal and renewed social engagement. From a psychosocial lens, socio-familial support is identified as a decisive factor in both mental adjustment and medical prognosis.
