Reviewer s Comment for Publication.

This study explored how impostor phenomenon (IP) affects dental students' self-esteem at a North Indian university. A total of 332 students answered online questionnaires using the Clance Impostor Phenomenon Scale (CIPS) and Rosenberg Self-Esteem Scale (RSES). The study concludes that impostorism is common among dental students and may harm their mental health, so support systems and curriculum changes are needed.

Strengths:

- 1. Large sample size (332 students) with good response rate.
- 2. Used standardized and validated scales.
- 3. Covered multiple academic levels (UG to PG).
- 4. Highlights an important mental health issue in education.

Weaknesses:

- 1. Limited to one dental college in North India.
- Convenience sampling may cause bias.
 No practical intervention or follow-up was studied.
 Relies only on self-reported data.

Overall Assessment:

This is a useful study showing how impostorism lowers self-esteem in dental students. It stresses the need for academic and emotional support. However, results are limited by single-center design and lack of intervention.
