Reviewer's Comment for Publication

The paper titled "The Link between Swedavaha Srotas and Jwara: A Comprehensive Study" provides an insightful conceptual exploration of Ayurvedic physiology, connecting the role of Swedavaha Srotas with the manifestation and management of Jwara (fever). The author has effectively combined classical Ayurvedic references with modern physiological understanding, creating an integrative perspective that enriches current Ayurvedic scholarship.

Strengths

- The study demonstrates strong theoretical grounding in classical Ayurvedic texts such as Charaka Samhita, Sushruta Samhita, and Ashtanga Hridaya.
- It successfully establishes a **logical correlation** between *Swedavaha Srotas Dushti* and *Jwara Roga*, emphasizing physiological and pathological interdependence.
- The integration of modern biomedical perspectives (thermoregulation, hypothalamic control, and sweating mechanisms) adds depth and interdisciplinary value.
- The organization and coherence between sections—concept, pathology, management, and modern parallels—enhance readability and scholarly clarity.

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Areas for Minor Revision

1. Language and Formatting:

- Improve sentence flow and consistency (e.g., "To studyand understand" → "To study and understand").
- o Ensure consistent spacing after punctuation and between paragraphs.
- Use uniform capitalization for Ayurvedic terms (*Jwara*, *Swedavaha Srotas*, *Pitta Dosha*, etc.).

2. Abstract:

- The abstract is informative but can be shortened slightly to enhance clarity and impact.
- Use clear subheadings or concise transitions between objectives and findings.

3. Tables and Headings:

- o Ensure proper numbering sequence (e.g., Table 3 missing).
- Label all tables clearly with concise captions (e.g., "Comparison of Nidana of Jwara and Swedavaha Srotas Dushti").

4. References:

- Maintain consistency in reference style (e.g., spacing before/after author names, ensure uniform use of "Vol-2," "Vol. 2," etc.).
- Verify recent publication years and correct minor typographical errors in entries (e.g., unnecessary parentheses).

5. Discussion and Conclusion:

 The discussion is strong; however, a short concluding paragraph summarizing key findings and future scope (e.g., relevance for integrative medicine research) would enhance closure.

6. Grammar:

 A few lines need editing for grammar and clarity (e.g., "They form an essential system for maintaining the balance of body temperature..." could be simplified).

Overall Evaluation

The manuscript makes a **valuable theoretical contribution** to Ayurvedic physiology and pathophysiology. Its comparative and analytical approach enriches understanding of the Swedavaha Srotas–Jwara relationship and successfully bridges classical concepts with modern

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medical insights. With **minor language and formatting improvements**, this paper is **recommended for publication**.
