However, minor improvements are suggested, such as refining sentence flow for conciseness, ensuring consistent formatting of key terms (e.g., "Indian Knowledge System" capitalized uniformly), and possibly adding a brief mention of how specific management theories align with the Gita's teachings to strengthen the academic rigor. Overall, the paper presents an insightful synthesis of traditional Indian wisdom and modern management thought, contributing meaningfully to the field of value-based business education and ethical commerce. The manuscript is therefore accepted with minor revision.
