Reviewer's Comment / Report

Strengths:

- 1. **Relevance and Significance:** The topic is pertinent due to the high prevalence and psychological impact of infertility in developing countries. Focusing on two neighboring countries allows for comparative analysis and context-specific policy implications.
- 2. **Use of Reliable Data Sources:** The study utilizes recent Demographic and Health Survey (DHS) data, which enhances the reliability and representativeness of the findings.
- 3. Clear Objectives and Methodology: The objectives are well-defined, and the criteria for inclusion and exclusion are appropriately illustrated. The use of binary logistic regression for analysis is suitable for this type of study.
- 4. **Detailed Data Presentation:** The paper provides comprehensive tables presenting the frequencies, percentages, and regression analysis outcomes, facilitating transparency and understanding.

Weaknesses:

- 1. Clarity and Cohesion in Writing: The manuscript contains some grammatical errors, typographical mistakes, and awkward phrasing that hinder clarity. For example, sentences like "women less educated than Bengali" could be better structured.
- 2. **Inconsistent Formatting and Referencing:** The references appear as numeric in-text citations (e.g., [11], [12]), but the full reference list is not provided in the excerpt, making it difficult to verify sources. Also, some formatting inconsistencies in tables and text could be improved.
- 3. **Limited Discussion of Cultural Factors:** Although sociodemographic factors are discussed, the manuscript overlooks in-depth cultural, social stigma, and healthcare access issues that might influence infertility prevalence and reporting.
- 4. **Absence of Detailed Limitations:** The paper mentions some limitations, such as possible bias due to data collection focus; however, these are not elaborated sufficiently. A dedicated limitations section would strengthen transparency.
- 5. Language and Typographical Errors: Numerous minor typographical mistakes (e.g., inconsistent spacing, missing punctuation) are present throughout the text and should be corrected.
- 6. **Abstract and Conclusion Sections:** The abstract could be more concise, and the conclusion should clearly summarize the key findings, implications, and recommendations for future research or policy.
