Reviewer's Comment for Publication

The manuscript titled "Still on Trial: Reading Kafka's Modernity a Century Later" (lines 1–226) presents a well-researched and intellectually rigorous re-examination of **Franz Kafka's** *The Trial* on the occasion of its centenary.

The **Abstract (lines 3–25)** effectively frames the study within the broader concerns of law, authority, and freedom, and establishes a strong connection between Kafka's vision and the contemporary age of surveillance and algorithmic control.

The **Introduction and main analysis (lines 30–95)** demonstrate a nuanced understanding of modernist aesthetics, bureaucracy, and alienation. The author situates *The Trial* within the philosophical traditions of Enlightenment critique and modernist skepticism, reflecting strong interpretive depth and command over literary theory.

The discussion of Foucault's disciplinary power (lines 96–111) and Agamben's sovereign exception (lines 112–125) is conceptually sophisticated, showing mastery in theoretical

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synthesis. The linkage between Kafka's juridical world and the Foucauldian notion of panopticism (lines 104–106) is particularly insightful.

The **psychoanalytic interpretation (lines 126–161)** grounded in Lacan, Butler, and Žižek provides a compelling alternative framework that enriches the reading of *The Trial* as a text of divided subjectivity and unconscious desire.

The **final analytical sections (lines 162–203)** successfully integrate postmodern, necropolitical, and biopolitical dimensions, especially through Achille Mbembe's theory of necropolitics (lines 176–189), thereby extending Kafka's modernist critique into the domain of contemporary power structures.

The **References** (lines 204–226) are comprehensive, current, and relevant, covering major critical theorists and primary modernist thinkers. The manuscript reflects careful engagement with canonical and recent scholarship.

Overall, the paper achieves a high level of **theoretical sophistication**, **interpretive originality**, **and relevance**, offering a compelling interdisciplinary contribution to Kafka studies, modernist criticism, and philosophical discourse.
